Keynote: News from Washington

The federal approach to health information exchange continues to grow and change. What are federal goals for the coming years for sharing health information? What priorities will be emphasized and how will these priorities impact stakeholders across the industry?

Keynote: Transition to a Post-HITECH World

How effective was HITECH for increasing EHR adoption, and what challenges remain? What work is being done on a national directory solution, and how can these national conversations impact and support efforts in Michigan and other states?

Michigan has piloted a Knowledge Grid consisting of actionable, machine-readable knowledge objects to demonstrate the ability to enhance data passing through the statewide network to provide advanced clinical decision support. What were the goals and results of this pilot, and what does this capability mean for healthcare in our state and nationwide in establishing a Learning Health System?

Workshop #1: Understanding the New Quality Measure Landscape

With the transition to MACRA / MIPS and other changes impacting quality measure collection and reporting nationwide, healthcare professionals want to know how evolving quality measure initiatives will impact them and the industry. What is the new landscape of quality measurement programs currently impacting physicians and payers, how do those programs intersect, and what efforts in Michigan and across the nation to align quality measure submission can ease burdens on providers and health plans?

Workshop #2: Best Practices for EHR-Based Information Sharing

As electronic health record (EHR) vendors move towards interoperability, often healthcare providers become lost in updates, new functionality and changes to workflow processes. How are different EHR vendors working with providers, and what are tricks of the trade and best practices to move information in and out of EHRs, capture and transmit quality information, integrate Direct Secure Messaging, and other common tasks?
